Cellist Sterling Elliott was the Artist-in-Residence for the 2023 AMP Summer Series. He made a brilliant debut at AMP on Friday June 9, 2023 – the Opening Night of the AMP Summer Series. Mr. Elliott performed the *Cello Concerto No. 1 in A Minor* by Camille Saint-Saëns with the AMP Summer Series Festival Orchestra, under the direction of John Young Shik Concklin. Mr. Elliott performed to a sold-out audience at Sylvan Hills Middle School. He received several standing ovations and performed an encore.

Throughout his residency, Mr. Elliott shared his professional and artistic insight with AMP students. Mr. Elliott led a cello masterclass for students, followed by a mentorship session. He humbly reflected on his origin story growing up in a musical family, and his prolific career through curated discussions such as the Fireside Chat with Terrence McKnight. The College and Career program strives to help students successfully navigate their high school and post-secondary education opportunities. We offer students and their families programming focused on high school completion, the college application and audition process, and financial aid. In conjunction with group workshops, professional development opportunities, and individualized counseling AMP students are prepared to tackle their goals.

Each year, we connect AMP students to competitive colleges across the country to help them explore their options and ensure that they find a school and academic program that will catalyze them towards success. Alumni continue to receive support in creating resumes and cover letters, applying to internships and jobs, preparing for interviews, and navigating campus resources. Graduating seniors and alumni are also eligible to apply for the Chestnut Family College Scholarship, The Chestnut Family Instrument Fund, and the Chestnut Family Emergency Fund to help cover both the expected and unexpected costs of attending college.

FAMILY FOUNDATION

The Chestnut Family College Scholarship Fund was started in 2021 with the generous support of the Chestnut Family Foundation to aid AMP Seniors and Alumni in paying for college.

Each year, both graduating high school seniors and alumni receive funding to support the costs of their college tuition, fees, books, supplies, housing, living expenses. Students planning to study music are also eligible to apply for funding to purchase a high quality instrument to support their studies.

As of July 31, 2023, AMP has awarded 31 college scholarships to its alumni, totaling \$130,749.


